As part of Cleveland Clinic's Office of Government & Community Relations, our work centers around the Let's Move It initiative – our strategy for improving the overall well-being of the residents in the communities we serve by positively “moving the dial” on advocacy & policy, healthy lifestyles, education, and economic vitality.

Banner Schools maximize student enrichment and promote continuous programmatic improvement by meeting the following criteria.

- **Model Program Implementation:**
 - Administration of student assessments
 - Meeting of registration/submission deadlines
 - Completion of stakeholder feedback surveys

- **Robust Program Participation:**
 - Completion of all [Adventures in Health Science and MedicineSM](#) Connected Learning sessions and the Innovation Challenge; or
 - Completion of 4 or more [Dangerous Decibels[®]](#) sessions; or
 - Completion of [eXpressions[®]](#) by 30 or more students in 1 program, 20 or more students in 2 programs, or 10 or more students in all 3 programs (Art, Language, and Math); or
 - Completion of 10 or more [Worldwide Classroom[®]](#) sessions
